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Statement of Strategic Regional Priorities

The Canberra Region Joint Organisation (CRJO) is committed to supporting our members meet their strategic goals over the next 20 years. We are proud to present our aspirations in pursuit of these goals that we believe will make real, long-lasting change. The community is at the heart of everything we do and helping to provide an inclusive, resilient, sustainable, and prosperous region remains our top priority.

Over the next four years our focus will also be on addressing some of the key challenges regarding environmental protection, the economy and critical infrastructure by taking action and championing change to create a better future.

Who We Are

In 2017, amendments to the NSW *Local Government Act 1993* were passed to enable Joint Organisations to be established. Joint Organisations are local government entities with legal powers established by proclamation designed to bring regional and rural councils together for better regional outcomes. The CRJO was proclaimed a corporate entity within the NSW Local Government Act on 1 July 2018.


The Canberra Region is a unique and diverse geographic region which stretches from the South-West Slopes, through the Sydney-Canberra Corridor across the Eurobodalla down to the Sapphire Coast and then up to the Snowy Mountains. The CRJO consists of 11 member councils, the ACT Government, and the Canberra Airport.

The total population of the CRJO region, including the ACT, exceeds 800,000 with a total area of 92,000km2 and a gross regional product (GRP) of \$9.82 billion.

Our Region and Members

The CRJO region is located in South-Eastern NSW and surrounds the ACT. The region is predominantly rural with major towns being Batemans Bay, Bega, Bowral, Cooma, Crookwell, Gunning, Goulburn, Mittagong, Moruya, Moss Vale, Narooma, Queanbeyan, Tumut, Yass and Young. It also includes many smaller townships and villages and growing residential and rural-residential areas, particularly close to Canberra and along the coast.

The region has a very diverse topology stretching from the coastal areas in the east to the alps in the southwest and across the tablelands in the west.



What We Do

The CRJO provides a forum for councils, State agencies and other stakeholders to work together at a regional level to identify shared priorities, delivering important regional projects and better outcomes for communities.

The CRJO's core objectives include:

- 1. Establishing strategic regional priorities and developing plans for delivering these priorities.
- 2. Providing leadership and advocating for making real change in our communities.
- 3. Identifying opportunities for intergovernmental cooperation and become one voice on matters relating to the region.
